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
## From THE LIBRARY DIRECTOR

Since it opened in 1890, the Duxbury Free Library has been a place where people of all ages have been able to pursue research, remain informed, and find popular materials in many formats. The library sits in an attractive campus setting in close proximity to the Duxbury Art Association, the South Shore Conservatory, the Duxbury Rural and Historical Society, and three of the town's four public schools.

The library has been housed in three buildings throughout its history, the first a house refurbished and furnished as a library. The second, a brick neoclassical structure, was constructed near the Duxbury schools in the early 1900's; an addition in 1968 met the needs of a suddenly growing population.

In November 1997, the library tripled its space in a handsome old school building in the same campus setting, completely rebuilt into an open and airy new facility. In this current location, a commanding position on a hill overlooking the campus, the library's importance and role in fulfilling the needs of the community is emphasized.

Since 1984, the library has been a member of the Old Colony Library Network. This automated resourcesharing network of 28 South Shore libraries, including two academic libraries, provides bibliographic access to these collections, and an efficient delivery system. For patrons with needs outside the scope of our collection or the collections of network libraries, interlibrary loan (ILL) service through cooperative agreements with the state library system is available free of charge.



Strategic planning is used to set priorities, focus energy and resources, strengthen operations, ensure that employees are working toward common goals, and assess and adjust the organization's direction in response to a changing environment. Simply put, it guides our vision for the future. Writing our 2022-2027 Strategic Plan was a disciplined effort that pulled together input from library staff, Library Trustees, stakeholders, and residents.

In order to establish the framework and direction the plan would take, Library Trustees created a comprehensive survey and distributed it throughout the Duxbury community. Residents were asked to rate current library services and make suggestions for improvement.

Town administrators and committee members, as well as survey participants who expressed an interest in being involved with library planning, were invited to attend any of six focus groups. These focus groups identified areas of strengths and areas for improvement. After analyzing feedback from these focus groups, the planning team was able to categorize suggestions into five themes: Library as Commons, Cultural Awareness, Lifelong Learning, Prioritizing Fun, and Operational Focus.

Staff input came from a SWOC (Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, and Challenges) exercise to identify internal operational aspirations and recommendations for services and programs. All staff were given the opportunity to review the formalized goals and suggest actionable ways to help advance our services over the next five years.

## Everyone deserves a safe and welcoming place.

#### **Space Planning**

Evaluating the space we have and re-imagining how it is used in order to create a more welcoming experience.

#### **Digital Engagement**

We will provide patrons with efficient online access points for library services and information.

#### **Promote Civil Discourse**

We recognize the diversity of lived experiences and opinions in our community and believe we can express our differences in a respectful manner.

#### Technology

All patrons will have equal access to current technology.

#### **After-School Interest**

With our presence on the school campus, students are a major demographic with need for tailored library services.

#### **Civic Engagement**

We will reduce barriers to participating in and understanding local government.

We are committed to making the library a welcoming space to all patrons. You want more study rooms, more quiet spaces, and more places for groups to interact. We will work with parents to support and encourage the transition to independent fourth grader visits. You want us to offer more after-school activities. You also want us to be a gathering place, not just for library events, but for other organizations in town.

- Conduct a comprehensive review of our interior and exterior spaces.
- Provide both planned and pop-up activities in the afternoons for students coming to the library after school.
- Transform the lower level Resource Room into a user-friendly space.
- Keep the library's digital branch current, relevant, and user-friendly.
- Explore the feasibility of installing charging stations throughout the building.
- Hold after-school book clubs for middle school students.
- Provide information and resources for civic involvement.
- Make use of QR codes for tours and information.

- Schedule regular coffee klatch events for patrons with the Trustees and library staff.
- Create opportunities to engage with local elected officials.
- Add more comfortable seating to the children's room.
- Set up kiosk displays for trying non-traditional library materials.
- Offer hybrid meeting equipment to library users.
- Hold a class for 3rd graders each spring to get them ready to visit the library on their own as 4th graders.
- Expand our role as a source of information and connections for community and social services.



## The needs of the community are changing; we are putting you first.

#### **Diverse Collections**

The library is committed to maintaining a collection of materials that introduces and reflects a full spectrum of lived experiences.

#### **Community Partnerships**

The library will cultivate new connections with local organizations and will continue to nurture existing relationships.

#### **Social Justice**

The library is committed to advancing diversity, equality, antiracism, and inclusion to benefit all patrons.

#### **Cultural Enrichment**

The library will offer windows to other cultures through programs and facilitated discussions.

The library will offer broad collections, programs, and opportunities for discussions. You asked us to lead the charge in social justice issues, and to define our role in the community. You want us to engage with other town organizations and to prevent program redundancy by being the hub of cultural events.

- Conduct diversity audits on all collections and allocate a portion of the materials budget to purchasing diverse materials.
- Participate in community clothing and food drives.
- Develop programs that celebrate cultural diversity and have broad appeal.
- Collaborate with the Senior Center to facilitate multi-generational relationships.
- Partner with other libraries who already offer language conversation programs.
- Participate in community cleanups.
- Add a Disability Statement to our website.

- Have a presence at school functions.
- Add American Sign Language (ASL) to storytimes and other programs.
- Establish mutually beneficial relationships with local business owners and non-profit organizations.
- Create asset mapping to help identify community strengths and resources.
- Promote education and awareness of Land Acknowledgement Statements for both staff and patrons.
- Hold programs that teach the basics of different cultures and religions.
- Offer foreign language conversation groups.

#### **Media Literacy**

We will provide resources for people looking to navigate a shifting information landscape.

#### **Homebound Service**

The library will expand homebound delivery of library materials to residents unable to come to the library.

#### **Support School Curricula**

We will create a pathway with school faculty to support academic goals.

#### **Digital Media Lab**

The library will offer equipment and training for media conversion and digital content creation.

#### **Teen Programming**

The Young Adult Librarian will engage teens with programs and events designed to entertain and expand their thinking.

#### **Technology Life Skills**

We will provide support and instruction on current and emerging technology.

The library will provide varied programs, events, and opportunities for learning and personal growth for people of all ages. You want to understand your surroundings with ongoing education about the town and local history.

- Create opportunities to expose students to reallife career experiences, including all professions and trades.
- Promote materials and resources to support the school spring science fair.
- Create tutorials for Libby, hoopla, Overdrive, and other online services.
- Hold book sampling events at the schools.
- Explore partnerships with National Honor Society students.
- Create opportunities for patrons to try out new devices.
- Explore the feasibility of offering after-school homework help.
- Increase awareness of digital magazines and newspapers.

- Offer misinformation education and awareness presentations.
- Hold cooking demonstrations and classes.
- Send a letter to teachers at the beginning of the school year letting them know what we can do for them.
- Explore how to increase the availability of delivery to the homebound.
- Create STEAM book bundles for students.
- Create video content for social media.
- Schedule more evening and weekend programs.
- Create anime club for tweens.
- Purchase updated media conversion equipment.

We will evaluate our stewardship of special interest collections and explore potential expansion.

Library staff will provide opportunities for residents to stimulate their imaginations through creative outlets. You want more programs for school-aged children and opportunities for adults to learn, create, and be entertained. You want family activities, interactive activities, and more writing workshops and opportunities.

- Organize trivia and paint nights at local establishments.
- Have live music in the Reading Garden.
- Hold a NaNoWriMo (National Novel Writing Month) programming campaign for kids, teens, and adults.
- Schedule simultaneous activities for parents and children.
- Develop a family history research resource.
- Explore the feasibility of offering iPads and Kindles for checkout.
- Hold wellness and meditation programs.
- Schedule regular opportunities for patrons to share their favorite books.
- Establish interest and hobby groups.
- Schedule programs at the beach.

- Hold job fairs for teens and adults.
- Add more staff-run book clubs, including evening meetings.
- Offer programs about Duxbury's natural resources.
- Launch Summer Reading with an annual Family Fun Day.
- Highlight History Room materials and make connections with area historians.
- Develop and offer programs on how to podcast, how to blog, how to write and publish a short story, how to write and publish a poem.
- Create a Life Beyond School series with local tradespeople, business people, and teachers.
- Explore the feasibility of holding Virtual Reality (VR) Tournaments.

#### **Marketing Effort**


We will increase public awareness about library services, opportunities, and programs.

We want to give you the most value for your tax dollars and are challenging ourselves to constantly analyze our internal and external services.

- Analyze usage of existing collections.
- Explore the feasibility of installing electric car charging stations.
- Perform a building-wide cleanup.
- Conduct a building-wide signage audit, inside and outside, and redesign signs as needed for maximum information efficacy and cohesive branding.
- Make phone messages more user-friendly.

- Explore options for more convenient materials returns, i.e. a drive-up book drop.
- Investigate more userfriendly arrangements of our collections.
- Set up and train patrons and staff on self-checkout system MeeScan.
- Explore the feasibility of creating a short video that introduces the library and explains its different functionalities.





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
